#### A MOMENT OF PEACE IN AKRON



On Thursday, December 21, 2023 The Akron Area Interfaith Council hosted a candlelight vigil for peace in the world at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Akron. Many people from diverse backgrounds came together to hear prayers being offered by representatives from the Akron area faith community. The faith leaders were from The Baha'I

Faith, Unitarian Universalism, The House of the Lord, The Jewish Faith, The Akron Interfaith Immigration Advocates, the Muslim Faith, and the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers). Father Shevchuk from the Holy Ghost Ukranian Catholic Church was scheduled to be there,

but had to cancel due to illness. Each faith leader offered insights for all to ponder in solidarity with each other. Members of the faith community joined together to grieve for those who are suffering as a result of war, to pray for peace throughout the world and to reconnect with our humanity and with each other.

Participants lit candles in the darkness of the Winter Solstice and were challenged to not just pray for peace, but to go out and do the work of peace by reaching out to those who may seem different than them. They were challenged to get to know someone from a faith or culture other than their own, and to ask themselves "What am I willing to do to bring about peace in my family, my community, my country, and my world?". Participants left with hope in their hearts and a sense that Peace is possible.

26.2 TO LIFE MOVIE AND PANEL DISCUSSION with Markelle Taylor Sunday January 14, 2024 at 3:00pm Akron Civic Theatre



The San Quentin Prison Marathon has an unconventional route: 105 dizzying laps around a crowded prison yard. 26.2 TO LIFE is a new documentary that tells the story of incarcerated men who are members of the 1000 Mile Club, the prison's long distance running club. They train all year for this 26.2-mile race. For the men who take their places at the starting line on a cool, sunny November morning, completing the marathon means more than entrée into an elite group of athletes. It's a chance to be defined by more than their crimes. Cheering them on is a small staff of volunteer coaches, veteran marathoners who train with the runners throughout the year. The bonds they forge on the track create a community that transcends prison politics and extends beyond the prison walls as members are released. 26.2 TO LIFE is a story of transformation and second chances. The film offers a rare glimpse into a world out of bounds, as the men navigating life sentences seek redemption and freedom... or something like it.


