

### Friends:

You have all been very generous these past 14 years. We are asking you once again to donate, as you are able, to the 14th Annual Hunger Walk sponsored by the Akron Area Interfaith Council (AAIC), where 12% or 67,760 Summit County residents were food insecure in 2022. Nearly a third of that number (21,030) is made up of children. That is unacceptable to the Akron-Canton Foodbank and should be unacceptable to all of us.

Although inflation is declining, as well as fuel prices (temporarily), the cost of groceries remains high, accounting for 30% of families within the Foodbank network that visited a food pantry for the first time ever in 2022.

Please, make the 14th Annual Hunger Walk a success by your donation and participation in the Walk itself on May 7. Last year's donations totaled \$25,942.08 from the Walk in Fairlawn and donations to the Stark Co./N. Canton collection drive.

# **Overall Food Insecurity Rate**

#### FOOD INSECURITY

Food insecurity refers to the USDA's measure of lack of regular access to enough food for an active, healthy life for all household members and limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate foods.

Food insecure households are not necessarily food insecure all the time. Food insecurity may reflect a household's need to make trade-offs between important basic needs, such as housing or medical bills, and purchasing nutritionally adequate foods.

# **SNAP Changes- What You Need To Know**

- SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), formerly called food stamps, is
  a government program that helps people buy the food they need for healthy lives
- During the pandemic, SNAP Emergency Allotments were issued for individuals to receive additional benefits
- After 3 years of receiving SNAP Emergency Allotments as a result of the pandemic, about 1.5 million Ohioans will be losing those additional benefits in March 2023
- Ohio's food banks will not be able to make up for the significant loss of food purchasing dollars left by the reduction in emergency COVID-19 SNAP allocations. At this time of sustained inflation and high food prices, Ohio's food banks do not have the infrastructure or capacity to respond to the volume of people seeking our help without continued and sustained support
- In Summit County alone, nearly 80,000 individuals will be affected by a loss of almost \$6.3 million in these additional SNAP benefits

# The Response

- Locally, the Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank is preparing its network for this change and asking its network partners to be prepared for an increase in demand due to the loss in these additional benefits
- The Foodbank's pop-up pantry will be providing additional food distributions in March, April and May
- The Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank is engaging in work around the Farm Bill, which contains provisions for nutrition programs like SNAP. The current Farm Bill, the Agricultural Improvement Act of 2018, will expire in September of 2023 and negotiations for a new bill have begun. As the bill is debated in Senate and House Agricultural Committees, it will be critical for hunger-relief advocates to make their voices heard to strengthen the country's SNAP program, and protecting and ideally increasing the benefits individuals are eligible for monthly


