DAYS OF CARING

Mitzvah Day brings together members of area congregations for caring in the community.

Volunteers prepare hundreds of meals for the hungry, sort clothes for the homeless, brighten the days of children in need, visit seniors in nursing

homes, provide entertainment to children and teens, paint or spruce up an agency working to serve underprivileged individuals, or clean up outdoor parks that are enjoyed by many in the community — all in just one weekend.

In keeping with Judaism's teachings of tikkun olam, to repair the world, Mitzvah Day, managed by Temple Israel, strives to inspire its participants to pursue social justice through social activism. Mitzvah Day was brought to Temple Israel in 2002 and has since been extended to more than 15 greater-Akron area congregations over 3 days.

Habitat for Humanity and Islamic Society of Akron and Kent are kicking things off on Friday. HFH is offering volunteers the opportunity to take part in a 2-day "Neighborhood Reborn" project. The event will focus on two or three streets in the University Park/ Middleburry neighborhoods. Projects during the two days may include: critical home repairs for qualified homeowners, installation of solar powered security lights and general landscaping. ISAK's event is a food drive for the Akron Canton Regional Foodbank.

Mitzvah Day wraps up on Sunday, with several projects throughout the morning, advocacy meetings in the afternoon and then the potluck dinner from 4:00-6:00 p.m., which will conclude the event,



It Takes All of Us !



We are inviting you to join us in the fight for justice and equity in our communities. Our coalition is made up of organizations such as The Freedom BLOC, St. Ashworth Temple, Akron NAACP, Akron Urban League, and Ohio Families Unite Against Police Brutality.

We are deeply troubled by the Grand Jury's decision not to indict the eight officers who murdered Jayland Walker. This incident is only one of many examples of systemic racism and police brutality that have plagued our society for far too long. Our demands are simple; we ask that the Department of Justice conduct a pattern-and-practice investigation into the Akron police department, a federal investigation into the murder of Jayland Walker, and that those accountable for his death be fired and prosecuted.

In the spirit of change and justice, we are organizing a series of "We Are the Change" marches for Justice for Jayland Walker and all those who have been brutally murdered by police departments across the country. The march will take place on May 24th in Akron, OH. We aim to bring together directly impacted families of police violence, clergy, and a coalition of individuals and organizations who share our commitment to fighting for justice.

We believe that your organization can play a critical role in helping us build a movement for change. We ask that you join us in the march and demand justice for Jayland Walker. We also ask that you invite people and organizations from your networks to join us in this important work.

Women's Interfaith Spiritual Heritage (WISH)



WISH was formed from the gathering of women of many

different faiths, beginning in 2001, in response to the 9/11 attacks and treatment of those often marginalized or scape-

goated by the larger society. WISH has worked to support and amplify the voices of women in faith communities, having the belief that women's voices and ways of solving problems are often different from how problems are often seen in patriarchal systems. Women who join WISH learn about the cultures and faiths of others, reinforcing values of peacemaking. Book groups, panels, and use of the Circle Approach all help facilitate the building of cross

cultural relationships, and to seek action for ongoing struggles.
